# FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERIOR DELEGATE



Dear brothers.

Peace be with you!

These were the first words of Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost, elected Pope Leo XIV on May 8, 2025, as he stepped onto the balcony of St. Peter's Square and greeted the immense crowd with the words of the Risen Christ. This greeting set the tone for his pontificate—a mission to champion global peace, build bridges, and foster universal fraternity. Pope Leo XIV emphasized that the peace offered by the Risen Christ is "a disarming, humble, and enduring peace that comes from God, who loves all of us without limits or conditions." This peace is not merely the absence of conflict; it is a transformative presence that calls us to reconciliation, dialogue, and solidarity among all people. I echo these words to all the brothers of NAD: Peace be with you! We need the peace of the Risen Christ not only in our hearts but also within our communities and among our brothers. As consecrated men in the Montian religious family, "God calls us to live in community, entrusting us with brothers to love" (Constitutions #80). Yet, we are not immune to conflicts, misunderstandings, and rivalries that erode peace and cause tensions in our communities. We do not choose our fellow brothers in community; each brother is a gift from God. Thus, we are called to foster genuine peace not only in the world we minister to but also within our own NAD communities. The need for peace among brothers is paramount, for it reflects the unity, love, and harmony of the Trinity. As the Constitution reminds us, "In communion of life, the brothers as members of Christ are to show mutual respect, correct one another as the Gospel commands, and bear one another's burdens as a family united in the Lord (#137).



The call to peace within our religious communities invites each member to embrace the peace of Christ—a peace that is disarming, humble, and enduring. It is a peace that demands self-emptying, forgiveness, and sincere dialogue. As the Apostle Paul reminds us, "If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all" (Romans 12:18). This exhortation challenges us to confront our own egos, prejudices, and insecurities, allowing the Holy Spirit to heal wounds and bridge divisions. Furthermore, the witness of peaceful fraternal life is a powerful testimony to the world. A community where mutual respect, understanding, and reconciliation thrive becomes a sign of God's kingdom—a place where God's love is not only spoken but visibly enacted. Pope Francis has reminded us that "Peace is not just the absence of war but a commitment to practice active love, even in the smallest of communities." Therefore, let us strive for peace not only in our external missions but within our own hearts and among our brothers. May the Risen Christ, who greeted his disciples with 'Peace be with you,' grant us the grace to build and sustain that peace within our communities and may our Blessed Founder, Blessed Luig Maria Monti pray for us.

### Editorial

HOPE DOES NOT DISAPPOINT



In his Bull of Indiction "Spes non confundit" - Hope does not disappoint, Pope Francis invokes hope as a gift for the Jubilee 2025. Right from the start of his pontificate, in his Apostolic Exhortation Evangelii Gaudium, no. 222-225, Pope Francis emphasized that time is superior to space. The important thing is to generate processes, to open up horizons of expectation, to make possible pathways and an orientation for life.

For the People of God, this is what the rhythm of the jubilee years and the pilgrimage route demonstrate. Every twenty-five years since 1300, the Church, through the jubilee year, invites us to make a new people, make a new beginning, open ourselves to the grace of forgiveness and encounter with the Lord, pointing thus towards the goal of our existence.

What better theme for this Jubilee 2025 than hope, which gives meaning to time by directing it towards eternity, avoiding the trap of being locked in the moment and discouragement.



To enter into this dynamic of hope, Pope Francis makes us contemporaries of those first-century Romans to whom Saint Paul wrote: "Hope does not disappoint, since God's love has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Rom 5:5). For Paul, hope stems from a conviction, nourished by his entire Jewish culture: God is faithful, He is committed to an irrevocable promise, and he gives strength for the good. What's more, it stems from an experience that was, for him, an event of conversion: God's love for every human being, capable of reaching out to him in his sin and in the depths of his trials. From then on, hope is much more than hope. It is that human feeling of optimism about the future, based on probabilities, which at times can disappoint. It becomes a theological virtue, a gift from God and a force capable of transforming every human life.

To say that hope is a virtue is to see it as active and fruitful. Hence, the call to change the way we look at the world, and to make a concrete commitment to putting up signs of hope through our mission here in NAD.

Dear brothers, in the face of the prevailing challenges we encounter everyday, the theme of this Jubilee year invites us to choose to look at all those signals, sometimes faint, that rekindle faith in each one of us, weave the bonds of brotherly and fraternal love and combat violence and division in our various communities here in NAD and in the Congregation at large.

Pope Francis invites us to take action in eight concrete areas, which are in connection with our mission and charism, daring to show signs of hope: commitment to peace, openness to life, attention to prisoners and the sick, care for young people, migrants and the elderly, and preferential love for the poor. Jubilee grace becomes visible and contagious when it gives rise to a thousand initiatives that restore hope.

This Holy Year invites us in a special way to rediscover with wonder the living encounter with Jesus Christ, who is both the "pillar" and the 'heart' of Christian hope. So let us enter into this dynamic of hope especially in these times of uncertainty and polarization, by becoming true ambassadors of hope in our various communities and places of mission, setting out on our journey to reach those who are looking up to us, experiencing God's love and forgiveness, and reorienting our lives towards the eternal life.


### BLESSED LUIGI MONTI (MEXICO)

### News & Updates



The election of Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost as Pope Leo XIV on May 8, 2025, took the entire world by surprise. An American and an Augustinian missionary with years of pastoral service in Peru, Pope Leo XIV was received with overwhelming joy by the universal Church. The faithful greeted the new successor of Saint Peter and Vicar of Christ with gratitude to God for the gift of a Shepherd after His own heart. The new Pope brings to the Petrine office a wealth of missionary experience, pastoral fervor, doctrinal clarity, and administrative wisdom. From the outset, his pontificate is marked by a clear commitment to building unity, promoting synodality, and responding compassionately to the pressing issues facing the Church today. Pope Leo XIV assumes the Chair of Peter at a time of significant polarization within the Church. Foundational beliefs—such as the sanctity of human life, the nature of marriage and family, the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist, priestly celibacy, and male-onlypriesthood—are being questioned and, at times, dismissed as outdated. He also faces the painful legacy of clerical sex abuse, financial scandals, and increasing divisions between so-called liberal and conservative Catholics. Furthermore, secularism, individualism, consumerism, and militant atheism continue to spread, echoing Pope Benedict XVI's warning about the "dictatorship of relativism." Pope Benedict XVI affirms that 'while ideologies divide, truth unites' (From the Depths of our Hearts). In his first address, Pope Leo XIV stated, "These are contexts where it is not easy to preach the Gospel and bear witness to its truth, where believers are mocked, opposed, despised, or at best tolerated and pitied. Yet, precisely for this reason, they are places where our missionary outreach is desperately needed." The choice of the name Leo XIV signals the inspiration he draws from Pope Leo XIII, known for his defense of the dignity of workers, the poor, and the marginalized, and for laying the foundations of Catholic Social Teaching through *Rerum Novarum*. Pope Leo XIV is expected to echo this legacy by promoting justice, peace, and care for the most vulnerable. As he begins his ministry as the Bishop of Rome and universal Pastor, let us pray that the Holy Spirit will guide him with wisdom and courage. May his leadership inspire renewed unity, holiness, and missionary zeal across the Church.
